

Naming Convention

- Inpatient Order Sets (OS)- will have 2-4 letter prefix to designate department followed by "IP".
 - HOSP IP Abdominal Pain
- Ambulatory SmartSets (SS)- will have 2-4 letter prefix to designate department followed by "AMB".
 - PC AMB Sinusitis
- "GEN" will be used in both Order Sets and SmartSets to designate when it is used by multiple departments.
 - GEN IP Asthma Pathway Admission
 - GEN AMB Ultrasound
 - Exception: Pre-Op Order Sets that are used in the ambulatory setting will just have Pre-Op
 - "Pre-Op" and "Post-Op" will be spelled with a hyphen in SmartSets & Order Sets
 - All Order Sets based on a medication will be named with the "generic (Brand)" naming convention
 - Display names should be in mixed case.

Hyperlinks

- Hyperlinks should be blue colored font
- Include "Reference Link:" before links to guidelines or CDS
 Reference Link: American Academy of Dermatology: Guidelines of care for the management of acne vulgaris
- Other links can be prefaced by "Link:"

Spacing, Font and color

- Font: Calibri (Body)- Size 11
- Clinical decision support information should be in red colored font and bulleted.
 - → Diagnosis
 - Combination therapy should be used in the majority of patients with acne see Treatment algorithm
- Bullet points should be concise
- Red colored font should be limited to 1 or 2 lines. Consider red initial line followed by black bulleted lines.

Penicillin Allergy (non-life threatening): Cefdinir

- 14mg/kg/day once or divided twice daily for 10 days
- Max dose: 300mg twice daily
- · Consider adding clindamycin if concern for penicillin-resistant Strep. pneumoniae

Alphabetization

Alphabetizing within sections of the Order Set or SmartSet is not a priority. The sequence of orders
within each section may be determined by the Order Set or SmartSet owner. Then approved by the
Order Set or SmartSet Committee or OS/SS chairperson.

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SmartSet Standardization

* The combining of individual diagnoses, medications, labs, or procedures within a section is permitted if it increases efficiency and is approved by the SmartSet owner, SmartSet Committee, and SmartSet chairperson.

- I. Title
 - a. Preface
 - i. 2-4 letter prefix to designate department. Ex. "PC" for Primary Care
 - ii. Followed by "AMB" to designate ambulatory
 - b. Name As specific as possible, but inclusive of included diagnoses
- II. Diagnoses Promote ICD-10 compliance (list only the ICD-10 name and not the ICD-10 code)
- III. Medications
 - a. In-Office Medications
 - b. Prescription Medications grouped by class and/or severity and/or evidence-based recommendations
- IV. Supplies DME
- V. Labs
 - a. POCT
 - b. Clinic Collect
 - c. Lab Collect
- VI. Radiology/Imaging- Imaging- List most common imaging orders first.
- VII. Procedures
 - a. In-Office
 - b. Other
- VIII. Consults/Referrals

 - a. Patient Instructions
 - b. Patient Education

Order Set Standardization

- I. Title
 - a. Preface with Dept. descriptor and then IP ex: "Hosp IP" for Hospitalist
 - b. Name As specific as possible, but inclusive of included diagnoses
- II. General Section
 - a. *Admission Orders
 - b. Nursing Special
 - c. *Vital Signs
 - d. Notify Physician
 - e. Isolation (standard panel)
 - f. *Activity
 - g. *Diet/Nutrition
 - h. Nursing Assessments
 - i. Nursing Interventions
 - j. Respiratory Interventions
 - k. Physician Consults
 - I. Ancillary Consults
 - m. Patient Education
 - n. Precautions (ex. Reflux precautions)

- IV. Labs- List labs in sections unless otherwise specified
 - a. Point of Care
 - b. Cerebrospinal Fluid
 - c. Chemistry Basic
 - d. Hematology
 - e. Microbiology
 - f. Stool
 - g. Substance Levels
 - h. Urine
 - i. Virology
- III. Imaging- List most common imaging orders first. If unknown then list alphabetically
 - a. Abdomen & Pelvis
 - b. Chest
 - c. Head & Neck
- IV. Other Tests
 - a. Ex. Cardiac Studies
