What Makes a GREAT Clinical Teacher?

These skills can be learned and developed

- 1. Enthusiasm for teaching
- 2. Respect for the learner/student
- Focus on the learner's needs →
 "why, "how" and "what if" questions stimulate learning
- 4. Serve as a professional role model and mentor
- 5. Sets goals and hold learner accountable
- 6. Explains thought processes and describes clinical patterns used to make clinical decisions

Ways Clinical Teachers Can Establish an Environment to Self-Motivate Students		
Psychological Need	General Principle	Specific Action
Relatedness	Treat students collegially	Introduce them to the team and make sure everyone knows each other's names and roles
	Integrate the student into the clinical environment through orientation	Show the students how things work, where and how clinical work is done
		Give the student a place to put their things and a place to work and study
	Value the personal lives of students	Ask about non-medical topics such as outside interests and identify common areas of interest
		Ask about career interests and learning objectives
	Offer emotional support	Periodically "check in" to see how they are faring with stresses of the clinical environment
	Maximize continuity of the relationship between preceptor and student as well as between student and patient/family	Make effort to align schedules Try to keep patient assignments the same for consecutive days, arrange follow-up of outpatients when the student is back in clinic

Time Management Tricks

- Set the expectation of how long you want to the resident/learner to take in the room
- 2. Jump into encounter if need be and let the resident/learner summarize the information they have gathered thus far
- 3. Have the resident put orders in and/ or add to the assessment and plan while you are talking with the family
- 4. Have the resident enter the assessment tools (ex: EZB, ACT, PHQ-9)
- 5. Have the resident/learner look something up or read (ex: guidelines or an article) or catch up on notes while you catch up seeing patients
